


Adult Discharges, OR Cases & Deliveries





Emergency Room Visits & OP Registrations






Emergency Care

Hospital & Emergency Room Payer Mix




Mental Health Care

Bad Debt & Charity Care

Bad Debt

Balances owed by patients whom we believe have the means to pay, but who do not pay their bills.

Charity Care

Balances owed by patients whom do not have the means to pay. Hospital Financial Assistance is offered to uninsured or under-insured patients who meet the criteria* for assistance.

*At or below 400% of poverty level

Past Legislative Impact

- √ 11th worst state for number of uninsured individuals (11.75% of adults in SC; National average is 8.6%)
- ✓ SC did not expand Medicaid through the ACA
 - Kept 123k uninsured; 223k could have been covered through Medicaid expansion
- ✓ Several independent studies show that states that expanded Medicaid saw a 32% decline in uninsured visits



Past Legislative Impact

Affordable Care Act – Legislation written in 2010 and effective in 2014

Proposed impact was to cover more people with health insurance (30 million uninsured would gain coverage)

Sequestration – Budget Control Act of 2011, effective in 2013, meant to control Medicare Spending, 2% payment reduction to providers

• Equates to \$2,130,000 per year in payment reductions

Readmission Penalties – Hospital Medicare payments reduced up to 3% starting 2015 for readmissions within 30 days

• BMH -2015-2017 = 3% (3,189,000); 2018 = .98%



Past Legislative Impact

- SC State Pension Plan impact
 - ✓ Currently BMH contributes 13.6% of salaries to plan
 - ✓ New legislation requires additional 1% each year until the year 2022, which equates to a per year increase of...

\$1.2 million

Millage subsidies for indigent care ceased after 2007





Salaries, Benefits & Supplies As a % of Net Revenue






Revenue & Expenses Per Adjusted Admission

Future Legislative Economic Impact

Medicaid Disproportionate Share Program

- Established in 1981 to provide partial payments to hospitals caring for uninsured nonelderly adults and to offset Medicaid Losses
- ACA calls for \$43 billion reduction through the year 2025
- In 2018, a scheduled reduction of \$2 billion, \$90 million reduction to SC, which equates to a \$2 million negative impact to BMH



Future Possible Legislative Economic Impact

- CMS Site Neutral Payment Proposal
 - Proposed Rule that would cut payment to off-campus hospital based departments by 50% of current fee schedule
 - Ex Lowcountry Medical Group
- CMS 340B Payment Reduction Proposal
 - Proposed payment cuts for Medicare part B drugs by 27%
- Uncertainty around Healthcare reform
 - Ex. "Repeal and Replace" 22 Million Uninsured

Brief History of VA

The United States has the most comprehensive system of assistance for Veterans of any nation in the world with roots that can be traced back to 1636.



VA History Continued

- The Pilgrims of Plymouth Colony passed a law that stated that disabled soldiers would be supported by the colony.
- Later, the Continental Congress of 1776
 encouraged enlistments during the
 Revolutionary War, providing pensions to
 disabled soldiers.



VA History Continued

- In 1811 the federal government authorized the first domiciliary and medical facilities for Veterans.
- Also in the 19th century the nation's Veterans assistance program was expanded to include benefits and pensions for Veteran's widows and dependents.



VA History Continued

- Following the Civil War many state Veterans homes were established.
- At these homes incidental medical and hospital treatment was provided for all injuries and diseases, whether or not of service origin.



VA History Continued

 The VA continued to evolve through WWI and WWII to become the Federal Program that we have today.



VA Structure

The VA consists of three components:

- 1. VHA Veterans Health Administration
- 2. VBA Veterans Benefits Administration
- 3. NCA National Cemetery Administration



VBA

- What we do at the Beaufort County Office
 - Assist Veterans to file claims and applications for
 - VA Compensation and Pension
 - DIC/Widow Pension
 - Home Loan Certificate and Eligibility
 - Dependent Education Assistance
 - Referral to VA medical care



Beaufort County Office continued

- Burial/Memorial benefits referral to National Cemetery
- Resource/referral to other divisions within the Veterans Administration.
- Veterans advocate to advise and assist in Appeals Process



Claim Criteria

- Disability claims must be service connected.
- Disabilities may appear many years after a Veteran separates from the service.
- Disability must be a continued and persistent problem that can be documented by medical records either at the VA or a private physician.



Fully Developed Claim

What do we need to file your claim?

- DD-214
- Marriage Certificate
 - Spouses birth date and SSN
- Dependents Birth Certificates
- Social Security Numbers for dependents
- Divorce decrees for veteran and spouse
- Direct Deposit information
- Do not miss a medical examination you are scheduled for by the VA



VA form 21-0966

The VA form 21-0966 allows the veteran to inform the VA he/she intends to file a claim.

This form holds the effective date for one year and allows the veteran to gather up the required documents to file a fully developed claim.



Veterans Pension

Pension is a needs-based benefit paid to a wartime Veteran because of permanent and total disability, the disabilities do not have to be serviceconnected (SC), or

- having attained age 65, or
- a surviving spouse or surviving child because of a wartime Veteran's death.



Survivors Pension

The Survivors Pension benefit, which may also be referred to as Death Pension, is a tax-free monetary benefit payable to a low-income, unremarried surviving spouse and/or unmarried child(ren) of a deceased Veteran with wartime service.



Appeals

- The Appeal process is a long a drawn out affair that tasks the patience of all Veterans.
- To have a successful appeal it in necessary to have new and material evidence to present to the Board of Veterans Appeals.
- The shortest route to an Appeal decision is a De Nova Review by a Decision Review Officer.




Appeals Continued

- Currently Columbia has over a 11,000 appeals backlog that they are currently working through.
- The VARO has recently added 4 new DRO's for a total of 10 working these cases.
- The traditional appeals process is now 1441 days from start to finish. That is 3 years 9 months in the traditional appeals process.
